Protect Funding for Indiana's Breast & Cervical Cancer Program



Program Overview

- Approximately 4,000 low-income women are served by Indiana's Breast & Cervical Cancer Program each year.
- Services include no-cost mammograms, pelvic exams, office visits, biopsies and more.
- Women who are diagnosed with cancer through the program are eligible for Medicaid coverage (MA-12) that lasts for the duration of their cancer treatment.
- Demand for the Program will continue to grow due to the effects of COVID-19 pandemic.


Program Funding

- The Program receives \$1.8 million in funding from the Centers for Disease Control, but the CDC requires a 1-to-3 state match.
- The Program received just \$176,000 in state appropriations in the FY 19-20 budget.
- A reduction in the Program's state appropriation could put federal funding at risk.
