Breast and Cervical Cancer in Indiana

- 5,400 Hoosiers were diagnosed with breast cancer in 2020
- 270 Hoosiers were diagnosed with cervical cancer in 2020
- 41,000 Hoosiers are eligible for IBCCP services and this is likely to grow due to COVID-19.

Indiana Breast and Cervical Cancer Program Overview:

- The Indiana Breast and Cervical Cancer Program offers no-cost prevention and treatment services to low-income women who have no insurance or are underinsured.
- Women who are diagnosed with cancer through the program are eligible for Medicaid coverage that lasts for the duration of their cancer treatment.
- 4,000 Hoosier women rely on the IBCCP.

How the IBCCP is Funded:

- Most of the funding comes from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), but the CDC requires a 1-to-3 match, meaning the state must provide \$1 for every \$3 it receives.
- The IBCCP received just \$176,000 in state appropriations in the FY 2020-21 budget.
- Any reduction in the state appropriation could put federal funding, and the program itself, at risk.
