WHAT IS ACS CAN

The American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN) is the nation's leading advocacy organization working to help save lives from cancer. ACS CAN is the nonprofit, nonpartisan advocacy affiliate of the American Cancer Society.

OUR PRIORITIES

ACS CAN's policy priorities focus on improving the health of our community. They include:

- **Strong smoke-free laws, increased tobacco taxes and funding for tobacco control programs.**
- **Access to quality, affordable health coverage.**
- **Lifesaving screening programs that increase early detection.**

ACS CAN IMPACT

With support from our network of hundreds of thousands of advocates and coverage in every state, ACS CAN has seen great success in our policy priorities.

Smoke-free municipalities: Twenty-five states, along with the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands have laws that require non-hospitality workplaces, restaurants and bars to be smoke-free. These laws, along with local laws in other states, protect 61.1 percent of the U.S. population — up from 2.6% in 2001 — by reducing exposure to secondhand smoke.

Cancer screening funding: The National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program provides access to care for low-income, uninsured and underinsured women. Since 1991, 15.1 million screenings have been offered to 5.9 million women — 70% are women of color.

Cancer research funding: Since 2001, advocacy for cancer research has resulted in an increase of over \$16 billion in funding for the National Institutes of Health and a \$2 billion increase for the National Cancer Institute.

Affordable Care Act: ACS CAN advocates for critical protections in the Affordable Care Act, which has expanded coverage to 20 million nonelderly people, and an additional 13 million parents and adults through Medicaid expansion.
