GOP Primary Voters Support Closing the Medicaid Coverage Gap








RE: Survey of n600 Likely Republican Primary Election Voters in Mississippi

A majority of Republican primary voters support expanding Medicaid to close the coverage gap for hardworking Mississippians.

- 55% of Republican primary voters support Medicaid expansion to cover individuals who earn less than the poverty line there is limited opposition.
- 50% of Republican primary voters hold a favorable opinion of Medicaid with less than a third of voters holding an unfavorable opinion.
- Almost 60% of Republican primary voters think healthcare is unaffordable in the state.




GOP voters are unaware of Mississippi tax dollars leaving the state, so they support bringing that money home.



- **Nearly two-thirds** of Republican primary voters **were unaware** that over a billion Mississippi tax dollars are spent subsidizing other states' Medicaid programs.
- 71% of Republican primary voters support a program that allows more of Mississippi's federal tax dollars to be spent on getting hardworking Mississippians access to critical healthcare services.
- 62% say that closing the coverage gap would have a positive impact on the state's economy.

Republican primary voters are more likely to vote for elected officials who support closing the coverage gap.

- 45% of primary voters are more likely to vote for an elected official who <u>supports</u> Medicaid expansion and closing the coverage gap, and only 26% are less likely support them.
- This means supporting Medicaid expansion isn't something that would hurt a legislator in a primary (and would likely help them in a general election)
- Lt. Gov. Delbert Hosemann (55% favorable 27% unfavorable) is viewed positively by Republican primary voters, so his support will be helpful for getting Medicaid expansion passed.





Methodology: On behalf of the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network, this probabilistic survey was conducted February 19 - 20, 2024, with 600 likely Republican primary election voters in Mississippi. It has a margin of error of $\pm 3.96\%$. Known registered voters were interviewed via live phones and SMS. This survey was weighted to a likely Republican primary election voter universe.
