Tobacco use remains the leading cause of preventable death and disease in the United States and in Rhode Island. To address this enormous toll, we urge the General Assembly to take the following actions:



## SMOKE-FREE CASINOS

SUPPORT S-188 (Sosnowski) H-5464 (Tanzi)

- Exposure to secondhand smoke causes heart disease, stroke, and cancer.
- 20 states, including Massachusetts, already prohibit smoking in stateregulated casinos – and Mohegan Sun and Foxwoods in Connecticut remained smoke-free post-pandemic.
- This year marks the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Public Health and Workplace Safety Act – it's time to close the casino loophole and protect casino workers and patrons.
- 69% of Rhode Island voters support smoke-free casinos.



#### NO FLAVORED E-CIGARETTES

OPPOSE S-543 (DiPalma) H-5329 (O'Brien)

- · Flavors hook kids.
- There is overwhelming evidence that mint, menthol and other candy and fruit flavors are luring children and adolescents and fueling tobacco addiction in the next generation.
- The sale of flavored e-cigarettes has been prohibited in Rhode Island for five years.
- These misguided bills would allow flavored e-cigarettes back on the market in Rhode Island and gut important protections for our youth.
- Don't take a step backwards.



# FUND TOBACCO PREVENTION & CESSATION

#### Direct tobacco tax revenue to fund the RI Tobacco Control Program

- The CDC Office on Smoking and Health was eliminated and funding for the Rhode Island Quitline and school and community prevention programming is at risk.
- Rhode Island collects more than \$115 million in tobacco tax revenue but only a mere 0.0067% is spent on tobacco prevention and cessation initiatives. This is unacceptable.
- The Tobacco Control Program plays a critical role in countering an industry that is relentless in its pursuit to develop products that will addict a new generation of users.
