THE LINE:

- Tell a VERY BRIEF personal tie to the cost of health care related to access to cancer screenings, prevention, treatment, or research. 2-3 sentences. <u>Don't overthink it!</u>
- Maintaining funds for breast and cervical cancer screening programs is necessary. Proactive, regular screening tests are useful in detecting pre-cancer and cancers at earlier stages, when treatment is less costly and more effective.
- Ongoing state investments in cancer research and innovation programs stimulate Florida's economy while also saving precious lives.
- Medicaid coverage remains critically important for many low-income state residents who depend
 on the program for cancer and chronic disease prevention, as well as early detection, diagnostic,
 and treatment services. Medicaid enrollees should have adequate access to care to ensure they
 have the best chance to detect, treat, and survive cancer.

THE SINKER:

Will you support \$3.6 million in recurring state funding for the Mary Brogan Breast & Cervical Early Detection Program?

Making The Ask: Hook, Line, and Sinker

Options depending on response lawmaker gives to your asks:

- If answer is YES: "Thank you so much for your support and for meeting with us today."
- If answer is **UNSURE**: "Can we get you any more information on the issue to gain your support? Can I leave my contact information in case you have further questions when deciding how you will vote? Can I follow-up with you in a week or two?"
- If answer is **NO**: "Thank you for your time and consideration today, please don't hesitate to contact me if you have further questions prior to your final vote on this important issue."

Additional Talking Points for Your Line:

Mary Brogan:

- The Mary Brogan Program provides lifesaving cancer screenings for medically underserved women between the ages of 40 and 64 who have incomes below 200% of the federal poverty level.
- Breast cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death for women. An estimated 23,920 Floridian women will receive a breast cancer diagnosis in 2025 and an estimated 3,210 are expected to die from this disease.
- Florida currently invests \$3.6 million state dollars in this program which provides medically underserved women access to screenings and diagnostic services, including mammograms, Pap tests, HPV tests and diagnostic testing if abnormal results are found. During the 2025 Legislative Session, the state allocated an additional \$1.83 million in non-recurring funding to the base \$1.83 million. Program eligibility was also increased to ages 40-64 (from 50-64), meaning more women now qualify for screening. We want to ensure the full \$3.6 million is recurring in the state budget.

Cancer Research:

- ACS CAN supports continued state funding for cancer and biomedical research, including the Casey DeSantis Cancer Research Program, the Florida Cancer Innovation Fund, the Bankhead-Coley Cancer Research Program and the King Biomedical Research Program.
- These state cancer research programs enhance the quality and competitiveness of cancer care in Florida. The funding will also further a statewide biomedical research strategy directly responsive to the health needs of Florida's citizens and capitalize on the potential educational opportunities available to its students.
